

Key Facts – What you need to know

- Name and locate cities and countries of the United Kingdom.
- Learn about a region of the United Kingdom.
- Describe and understand the key aspects of physical geography and human geography, including types of settlement and land use.
- Use vocabulary such as region, city, country and environment.
- Observe, measure and record the human and physical features in the local area using a range of methods.

Enquiry and investigation

- Ask simple geographical, 'where?', 'what?', and 'who?' questions about the world and their environment e.g. 'What is it like to live in this place?'



Key Vocabulary

Region	An area, especially part of a country or the world having definable characteristics but not always fixed boundaries.
City	A large human settlement with defined boundaries. Can sometimes have capital status.
Country	A distinct area with defined boundaries, with its own government and territory.
Environment	A particular geographical area, especially affected by human activity.
Physical features	Something that has happened naturally. Features include forests, cliffs, the sea, the weather and the seasons.
Human features	Something that is built by humans and would not have existed in nature without humans. Features include houses, cities, factories, farms, ports and harbours.
Settlement	A place where people establish a community.
Landmark	Something (such as a building, large tree or statue) that is easy to see and can guide people.
Land use	The management and change of the natural environment.
