- Observe, measure and record the human and physical features in the local area using a range of methods including sketch maps, cameras and other digital devices.
- Communicate geographical information through a range of methods including sketch maps.
- Use a wider range of maps (including digital), atlases and globes to locate countries and features studied.
- Recognise that contours show height and slope.
- Link features on maps to photos and aerial views.
- Express opinions and personal views about what they like and don’t like about specific geographical features and situations.



Key Vocabulary

Region	An area or part of a country or the world.
Lake District	A region and national park in Cumbria in Northwest England
Physical features	Natural features on the Earth’s surface such as water, lakes, mountains and deserts.
Human features	Things that are made or built by humans.
climate	The long-term pattern of weather in an area, typically arranged over a period of 30 years.
Landscape	The visible features of an area of land, its landforms and how they integrate with natural or man-made features.
Vegetation	Plants considered as a group, especially those found in a particular area or habitat.
tourism	A social, cultural and economic occurrence which sees the movement of people to countries or places outside their usual environment.
settlement	A place where people live.
National Park	A natural park in use for conservation purposes, created and protected by national governments.
