	Romans	a person who lived in Rome or the Roman Empire in ancient times		
	Boudica	<b>Boudica</b> was the wife of King Prasutagus, ruler of the Iceni, a people who inhabited what is now modern Norfolk		
	empire	A large group of countries ruled over by one ruler.		
	conquered	to take control or possession of foreign land, or a group of people, by force		
	Boudica	Happening now		
	Hillfort	<b>built on hilltops and surrounded by huge banks (mounds) of soil and ditches.</b> They were protected by wooden walls which kept enemies out.		
	settlement	A place where people live.		
	tribe	a group of people that includes many families and relatives who have the same language, customs, and beliefs
